Our Nursery

We are delighted to have an excellent Nursery Unit, which is an integral part of the school and is situated in the main school grounds. Our teacher and Nursery Assistant are committed to ensuring that each child's formative experience of education is a positive one. We currently offer 26 full-time places. The building is spacious, bright and furnished with a range of equipment to provide a happy and stimulating setting. We also have a beautiful outdoor learning environment. Here your child may gain independence, develop initiative, make decisions and problem solve. The Nursery is very much a part of our school family and the children regularly use the main school facilities throughout the year.

Nursery starts at 0845 and finishes at 1315 Monday to Friday. In addition to this, the children are welcome to attend Breakfast Club from 0800 and After-school Club until 1600. Please be aware, like all nursery settings, there is a phasing in period for children at the start of the year, this does take a number of weeks.

Unlike a private nursery, our nursery is free for the children to attend. There is, however, a £12 per month charge to enhance your child's nursery experience. This pays for the children's snacks at break time and regular visits from Mr. Hullabaloo, Jo Jingles and other providers. Additionally, there is a weekly fee of £2.60 per day, for school meals (unless you qualify for Free School Meals).



We seek to provide a seamless transition for all children in our care. Our provision builds on the learning that children experience at home and in other settings. The Foundation Stage, in Primary 1 and 2 of our school, builds on all these play-based learning experiences by providing a curriculum that develops children's dispositions to learn and gives them the skills and competencies they will need to succeed in school and in future life.

Our Nursery staff work closely with our Foundation Stage staff to share the developments of your child, allowing for a seamless transition to Primary 1 in our familiar and nurturing setting. This benefits each child greatly and we advocate you making a decision, with this in mind, and in your nursery choice as the first step in your eight-year journey with us.

Through exploration and investigation, your child will have opportunities to learn in the six pre-school Areas of Learning:

- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Physical Development and Movement
- Language Development
- Early Mathematical Experiences
- The Arts
- The World Around Us.



The Classification of the School

We are a co-educational, controlled non-boarding primary school.

Our High Standards

We are proud of our children and all their achievements, academic and across the wider curriculum.

The progress of each individual child is closely monitored throughout their time at Earlview Primary School and Nursery. This is to ensure that every boy and girl reaches his or her full potential. Alongside the class teacher, each child will highlight areas for improvement in Literacy, Numeracy and other areas of school life. This provides a focus for each child to work towards a sense of achievement and pride as their targets are met. We make sure that our children are well prepared for the End of Key Stage assessment process and our staff have expertise in this area.

Gifted and Talented

Although all children are talented, some excel in a specific area and those whom the school recognise as gifted or talented will be nurtured and supported appropriately. We will ensure that they are challenged, stimulated and make progress at an appropriate pace. These individual arrangements will be made in consultation with parents.

Special Educational Needs

At Earlview Primary School and Nursery our Staff are committed to providing access to a broad and balanced curriculum. We recognise that some pupils, during their school career, have special educational needs and/or a disability. In the interests of these children, we will endeavour to make every reasonable adjustment to provide for their individual needs. Our Learning Support Co-ordinator and Special Needs Assistants use their expertise to put in place a range of interventions that help support our children and remove the barriers to learning. We are very well equipped with sensory equipment, each class has their own sensory boxes and every resource area has their own sensory tent to give the children a space to regulate their emotions. We even have our very own sensory space, which is available to those who require it. Every child in our school is part of the Earlview Primary School and Nursery family and can expect to be provided with a supportive learning environment and learning experiences appropriate to their ability. Communication with Family and our Local Community

At Earlview Primary School and Nursery we aim to work closely alongside Parents/Guardians and Carers in their child's education and excellent communication is vital for this.

Parents are invited to attend two Parent-Teacher Consultations each year, one during the first term and a second in term two. This ensures that parents/guardians are kept well informed of their child's wellbeing and progress. Additionally, an annual report is written by the class teacher and issued to parents/guardians in June.

Beyond this we seek to communicate with parents and the wider community in a variety of ways:

We use the Seesaw App to share pupil progress, celebrate successes and to communicate relevant class information with parents.

Each week we produce a 'Friday Newsletter' which shares information of what has taken place in school each week, as well as letting parents know about upcoming events.

Our school website provides information about each year group, after school activities, key dates and events.

We regularly update our school Facebook page with pupil achievements and all the exciting learning opportunities that are taking place both inside and outside the classroom.

We feel strongly that as a Primary School, in the heart of New Mossley, we are an integral part of our local community and it is important that we get involved with the people who live around us. We participate in local Church Services, our choir sings in local nursing home and we often support local charities. Members of the community are invited into school throughout the year, to our Christmas events, Open Night and 'Friends of Earlview' events.

Friends of Earlview

We foster a family ethos and this extends beyond our doors to everyone in the community and in light of this, we have a 'Friends of Earlview' organisation. This dedicated group is made up of Parents and members of our local community who are interested in supporting our school. They play a vital role in organising a wide variety of events for our pupils, parents and the local community to attend. They also raise substantial sums of money to provide books and equipment for the school.

Charges and Remissions

We provide a free education for all pupils at Earlview Primary School and Nursery under the Education Reform Order 1989.

There are just a few exceptions and these are detailed below:

- All board, lodging and travel costs on residential trips (except where statutory / remissions apply)
- Costs associated with optional extras, for example, visits to the theatre or extra-curricular activities
- Tuition in a musical instrument / swimming instruction
- £12 per month for snack and visits from Mr Hullabaloo, Jo Jingles and other providers in our Nursery
- Break-time toast - 30p per slice
- School meals - £2.60 per day
- Before and after school childcare.



School Uniform

In order to give our children a sense of pride and belonging we encourage our pupils to wear our school uniform. The uniform changes as the children progress through school. Curriculum

As a controlled school we follow the Northern Ireland Curriculum. Our teachers employ a range of innovative teaching methods and differentiated teaching to facilitate the needs of every child. Our classrooms are equipped with interactive whiteboards, iPads and Apple TV. Your child will experience: Numeracy, Literacy, ICT, the World Around Us (History, Geography and Science), the Arts (Art and Design, Music and Drama), Personal Development and Mutual Understanding, Physical Education and Religious Education. A copy of the curriculum policies, statutory rules, departmental circulars and inspection reports are available upon request from the school office.

Literacy	Numeracy
<p>Literacy is divided into three components of Talking and Listening, Reading and Writing. Through the teaching of English, the pupils develop a positive attitude towards this curricular area. Pupils are encouraged to develop their oral and written skills and are provided with opportunities to discuss, share information, debate and write formal presentations both in class and at assemblies. Our class libraries, special focus days and book fairs help to foster a love of reading. Our aim is to develop independent reading habits and our Reading Partners, Star Reader and Accelerated Reader Programmes are used throughout Earlview Primary School and Nursery. This increases the children's love for reading and improves reading ages and comprehension ability. English is essential as a subject in its own right. It also, however, has a vital part to play and is a medium through which all other subjects are taught, and aspects of English are introduced, developed and reinforced through other areas of the curriculum.</p>	<p>Acquiring mathematical skills is a vitally important part of a child's education and as such, skills are utilised daily in adult life. The maths curriculum covers the areas of Number, Measures, Handling Data and Shape and Space. Processes permeate all of these areas. Teachers make use of a variety of teaching strategies and seek to foster in the children a positive attitude towards the subject. There is an emphasis on relating the content to real life situations, and so, investigations and puzzle work are an important part of the curriculum. Children work as individuals, in pairs, and in groups to develop their problem solving skills. Mental strategies and the ability to make mental calculations are developed through the use of a wide range of games. The appropriate use of ICT resources, including iPads, Interactive Whiteboards and Bee-Bots enrich the learning opportunities of the pupils.</p>
Physical Education	Religious Education
<p>Physical Education is an important area within our curriculum and through it we aim to provide opportunities for the physical development, health and well-being of the children. Our school's extra-curricular programme also provides opportunities for the children to extend and develop their skills and interests acquired during PE lessons. Primary 5 to Primary 7 classes participate in swimming lessons. Some of our recent sporting activities have included football, hockey, gymnastics, basketball, badminton, Zumba and athletics.</p>	<p>We recognise that Religious Education has an important and necessary place in the overall educational task of providing a broad, balanced curriculum and we, shall endeavour to promote the spiritual, moral and cultural development of our pupils. The school follows the Education Authority syllabus for Religious Education. Provision can be made for pupils whose parents wish to withdraw them from R.E, collective worship or school assemblies. This provision will take the form of work in other curricular areas.</p>

The Arts

Children are provided with opportunities to engage in Music, Art and Drama. Music plays a significant role within the curriculum at Earlview Primary School and Nursery, with all children being given the opportunity to participate in singing, playing instruments, composing and listening to a wide range of musical styles. At present we have a choir comprising of children from P4 to P7. They have great fun getting out and about and singing at every opportunity. We are fortunate to work alongside the Ulster Scots Agency to teach our P5-P7 pupils the Chanter. This gives every child the opportunity to learn how to read music and develop their overall understanding of music theory.

Children learn so much about themselves and others by participating in Drama activities. Through role play, they learn to empathise with peers and see things from another's point of view. They also learn to turn take, speak clearly for an audience and express themselves confidently. Self-esteem and the fulfilment that comes from working with others towards a common goal is a great motivator for success and we, at Earlview firmly believe that the acquirement of such skills will be invaluable to our pupils as lifelong learners.

Art is a fun and enjoyable activity which encourages children to express their creativity. In the Early Years, children experiment with a wide variety of materials and create both two and three dimensional pieces of art. This progresses through the years with children being taught basic skills and techniques while still allowing them to express their own creativity. All children are encouraged to look at and appreciate the work of other children along with the work of artists and designers and to appreciate the role art plays in creating a colourful and attractive learning environment.



The World Around Us

(Including history, geography, and technology)

The World Around Us is a vital part of our curriculum. The children are given the opportunity to develop their natural curiosity, find out information, ask questions and develop an appreciation of their local area and the natural wonders of the world. In Earlview Primary and Nursery we have developed an extensive range of topics to enthuse and excite our pupils. The children will cover topics such as Space, Minibeasts, Extremes, Titanic, Giants and Castles and Egyptians.



Information Technology

At Earlview Primary School and Nursery we believe that purposeful access to ICT across the curriculum will motivate and increase engagement and achievement in our pupils and prepare them for the future. Classrooms are equipped with interactive whiteboards and we also have a dedicated Computer Suite. Pupils enjoy using mobile devices such as laptops and iPads which open up new opportunities for using ICT in school. This effective use of technology has been an exciting development and has presented both pupils and teachers alike with opportunities to enhance their ICT skills in a creative and productive way. We are continually undergoing training and upgrading and adding to ICT equipment to ensure that we are always up to date with the latest technology.



Personal Development and Mutual Understanding

PDMU is linked to all aspects of life and work in school. Through a variety of carefully planned activities the children will develop their self esteem, gain self confidence, develop empathy and learn how to interact with others.



Homework

Homework is an important part of school life. It encourages pupils to develop the skills needed for independent learning; consolidate and reinforces current learning in the classroom; gives you an insight into what is happening in the classroom and enables you to share in your child's learning.

Homework is set regularly for all children. For Primary 1 children, homework will mainly focus on reading, early mathematics and related activities. Primary 2 and Primary 3 children will continue with reading and mathematics along with the introduction of spellings and tables. In Primary 4 to Primary 7 a range of learning and written homework will also be included. As your child progresses through the school, homework will gradually become more demanding but less direct parental supervision should be required.

Enriching the Curriculum

In Earlview Primary School and Nursery we believe in fostering the development of the whole child. While academic achievement is important, we also place great value in promoting the physical, social, emotional and spiritual wellbeing of every child.



Extra-Curricular Activities

In Earlview, we are passionate about developing the child as a whole, and we are proud to offer a range of extra-curricular activities for children in Primary 1 - Primary 7. We love sport and we offer a range of sporting clubs, including Hockey, Football, netball and Badminton. We enter a variety of competitions with great success and we more importantly foster life long interests and enjoyment. Some of the non-sporting extra-curricular activities are Booster Club (Maths and English lessons), Art Club, Film Club and First Aid. Additionally, since April 2021 the school has been working in partnership with the Ulster Scots Agency. They have provided activities such as in Lambeg drum lessons, drama, Highland Dancing and bagpipe lessons.



Daily Mile

The Daily Mile is an initiative to encourage pupils to exercise for 15 minutes every day as part of their routine. We are continually striving to encourage our pupils' awareness and understanding of the immense value of the importance of healthy lifestyles and as such we have decided as a school to implement this idea across the school from Nursery to Primary 7. Each year group will go out on a daily basis to walk, jog or run around the school perimeter. Their aim is to complete as many laps as they can within the time and make small improvements each week. The Daily Mile has positive physical and mental impacts on the children's health and helps to improve concentration in class.

Forest Schools

We have made the most of our fantastic location near the local forest at Mossley Mill and we have extensively developed our school grounds to create a variety of nature areas and learning opportunities for our children. We are proud to have our very own Outdoor classroom, polytunnel and pond. These facilities provided unique learning opportunities for the children and encourages them to develop an appreciation of the natural environment.

We worked in partnership with NIFSA to become an official Forest School and the children are given the opportunity to be involved in weekly Forest School sessions using our extensive outdoor facilities. Children play co-operatively and creatively with their peers and enjoy being outdoors, whatever the weather! Our Forest School programme allows pupils to enjoy the freedom of directing their own learning without inhibitions, whilst developing their own personal skills.



Break and Lunch

In Earlview Primary School and Nursery we operate a Healthy Break Policy. We recognise the importance of a healthy diet and its effects on a child's education. Children are encouraged to eat fruit, milk and water at break times. Toast is also available to purchase for 30p per slice. For lunchtime our school meals are cooked on site in our superbly equipped kitchen. The meals are served in the dining hall with menus being provided in advance. All meals are prepared in-line with the government's most recent nutritional guidelines. Application forms for pupils entitled to Free School Meals are available on the EANI's website.



Afterschool Daycare

Our After School Daycare runs until 1600 daily. This allows parents to have greater flexibility with regard to the time that they collect their children from school. Children are provided with a snack and a varied timetable of stimulating activities are offered. Children can also complete their homework, with the help of our experienced classroom assistants.

Problems or Concerns

At Earlview Primary School and Nursery we aim to involve parents as early as possible if problems or concerns arise. Furthermore, we hope that you, as parents / guardians, will do the same with us. Simply send an email, write a note or telephone the school office and a suitable time will be arranged when you can discuss your concerns fully without interruption. If the matter remains, then Mr. Smith will be more than happy to discuss the problem with you.

After speaking with Mr. Smith, if you are still dissatisfied with the outcome then the matter may be taken to the Board of Governors.
